Working Together Works! Teamwork for Success in Implant Dentistry

Wednesday, October 19, 2016

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This clinical, usable information-packed presentation will address the close interaction of the implant surgeon with the advanced restorative dentist and the dental laboratory in achieving optimal esthetic and functional outcomes. Drs. Levine and Makrauer will emphasize the "Team Approach" to the most challenging implant and dental reconstruction procedures and "smile makeovers" involving the careful diagnosis and management of soft and hard tissues and their appropriate sequence in therapy when insufficiencies exist. Treating patients comprehensively using the oral plastic surgeon as a key in the complex prosthetic and esthetic reconstructions will be emphasized. In addition, immediate loading (SameDay Smile®) of fully and partially edentulous arches will be discussed with guidelines for usage of this life changing therapy for our patients, which Drs. Levine and Dr. Makrauer have been performing in their private practices since 1994. Gaining case acceptance will be addressed and how the "Team Approach" can make this process seamless and successful.

S P E A K E R B I O G R A P H Y

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Dr. Robert A. Levine maintains a full time private practice in the Einstein Center One Building in North-east Philadelphia focusing on Surgical Implant Placement, Cosmetic Oral Plastic Surgery Procedures and Re-constructive and Regenerative Therapy. He is presently a Clinical Professor in Post-Graduate Periodontics and Dental Implantology at the Temple University Kornberg School of Dentistry and a Clinical Assistant Professor at the University of North Carolina School of Dentistry at Chapel Hill. Dr. Levine is a Diplomate of the American Board of Periodontology and is a Fellow of the College of Physicians in Philadelphia. He has lectured extensively both nationally and internationally and serves on the Editorial Boards of numerous international scientific dental journals and has authored close to 70 articles and 4 book chapters. He is a Fellow of the International Team for Implantology (ITI) of Basel, Switzerland and was one of 100 representatives from around the world invited to participate in the ITI 4th and 5th Consensus Conferences in Stuttgart, Germany (2008) and in Bern, Switzerland (2013) respectively, to establish treatment protocols for implant dentistry worldwide. For the last 31 years (since 1984), Dr. Levine has been President, founder and Program Chairman of the Northeast Philadelphia Dental Implant and Perio-Prosthesis Study Club

and in 2009, he founded the Greater Philadelphia Dental Hygiene Study Club. He is also the founder, Director and Program Chairman of the Philadelphia Tri-State ITI Study Club since 2007.

Dr. Zola A. Makrauer maintains a full time private practice in Huntingdon Valley, Pennsylvania and is dedicated to providing a high quality cosmetic porcelain restorations, dental implants, and reconstructive dentistry to the Philadelphia area. Dr. Makrauer graduated from the University of Pittsburgh and the Temple University School of Dentistry. He has had extensive training in cosmetic esthetic and reconstructive dentistry.

Dr. Makrauer strongly believes in the proven concepts of the team approach, not only with his own team members, but also with the specialty teams with which he works. Trustee's Report: Our Future is Now

Back in 1971 George Allen committed football heresy by trading draft picks by the dozen for established yet aging veterans. When questioned about this outlandish action he stated "The Future is Now". I have always loved that term and really what it stands for, URGENCY. Today if

you ask me about the future of our specialty and the dental profession at large, I will quote George Allen and tell you "Our future is now".

Last weekend at the AAP BOT meeting we had a Mega Session with a backdrop of referral dentistry. The presenters were varied with representatives from the industry side of the profession and specialty, corporate dentistry, statisticians and the Executive Director of ASDA, the American Student Dental Association. The presentations were very well organized and informative. I was very impressed by the quality of the Mega Session. Unfortunately the message was not what we wanted to hear.

The data shows that dentists in the 55 year and older age group still do refer to specialists. They do so because this was the norm when they started in practice and continue to hold that belief and those relationships dear. However the baby boomers are approaching retirement which means winding down their practices or selling their practices. The potential buyer will be younger dentists and Dental Service Organizations (DSO). The dentists in the 40-55 age range for the most part do not refer out to specialists. Instead they either don't offer specialty services to their patients, do the specialty procedures themselves or bring in their own specialists. While that does create employment opportunities for specialists, this is not what practice owner specialists want to see. The age group from graduation to the 40ish range for the most part is working for DSOs. These larger group practices bring in their own specialist or have arrangements with a particular specialist. Clearly this trend it not how we envisioned our world when we entered periodontics and made the time and financial commitment.

There is a unique window and I am very happy to say that our NJSPDI has already begun discussions in this regard. In fact we had an all members invitation board meeting the night before I left for the AAP meeting and an action plan was formulated. While our plan was designed more for membership recruitment and retention, based upon what I heard at the AAP developing referral relationships has a good potential.

What Dr. Feinberg told us and that was confirmed by the Executive Director of ASDA is that the dental students have strongly indicated that they want mentors and mentoring. This is not from their dental school faculty, but real world dentists.



Several years ago Ethan Glickman and I brought this concept forward to the NJDA. The plan was to get a list of NJDA member dentists who would be willing to serve as mentors to the students at Rutgers and then make that list available to the dental students. The key to this process was the initiative of the dental students. We need to provide what they want, not what we tell them they want or need. Ethan and I were much more enthusiastic about this program and the dental school.

The thought process on this program was many. First as dentists (this is a dental profession issue and periodontics can be a big part of it) we are one on one people. Just look at the personal interaction we have with our patients daily. The second part is the personal relationships that we would build with the students when they are early in their carrier. We will be "that person" who has mentored them, helped them and cared for them. Those of us who were fortunate enough to have one of these mentors never get that. By making the investment in the young dental student we get a chance to help mold their career and how they view the profession. I mean this in a very good way. We get an opportunity to share our wisdom and values.

Finally when the time comes that the mentee thinks that walking away from organized dentistry is the way to go, the one phone call they don't want is from the mentor. How could one ever tell someone that has been so helpful to their development when they really needed help that those values that got me here are not important anymore? Along the referral lines, they would have seen the value for their patients and themselves so are they now going to say are they willing to think that quality is not part of my regiment?

So where do we go from here? Fortunately the executive director of ASDA loves the mentor program idea and wants me to present it to the ASDA Board of Trustees. I will keep you posted on this matter. Clearly this is by no means the magic bullet, but it is a great starting point. Considering what the landscape surround periodontics looks like, we need to move forward and this will have little expense. I will need to enlist the members of NJSPDI to make this a reality.

As I see it when looking at the viability of the specialty of periodontics George Allen was right "Our future is now."
